In November this year in New York State the Equal Rights Amendment will be on the ballot. To promote its ratification AAUW NYS is urging members to be become informed, share information with friends and family about the amendment, and to wear yellow roses to show support for its passage. We have knitted yellow roses for all members who would like one! I also have the very easy pattern to share.

When five of us visited the Women's Rights
National Park this past Saturday, March 9th,
one of the things I learned was that in 1923,
on the 75th anniversary of the 1848 Seneca Falls
Convention, Alice Paul announced that she
would be working for a new constitutional
amendment, one she authored and initially called
the "Lucretia Mott Amendment." This was three
years after the ratification of the 19th amendment.
It was introduced in Congress the same year.
